
Bristol Water Fishery Report

September & October 2025



The exceptionally low water levels continued throughout September and October, reaching a point not seen since 1976. After Blagdon's boats were brought to a halt in August, when the jetty reached its lowest safe limit, Chew Valley Lake soon followed, with both jetties now grounded and the lower section of the boat hard giving way to thick, clinging silt. It became increasingly clear that conditions had reached a critical stage, and after reviewing the long-range weather forecast and extraction data, we determined that only a few days remained before boat recovery would have become impossible.

This extremely difficult decision unfortunately coincided with two major events, the Garafit Cup and the Celtic League Final. The latter was cancelled due to severe winds, meaning that the Garafit Cup became the final boat competition of the 2025 season. Following this, we were forced to begin the challenging process of cancelling all remaining bookings for the year, including the Champion of Champions, the Bristol Water End of Season Competition, and the October and November Pike Trials.

This was a massive administrative and financial undertaking, involving the processing of hundreds of refunds through every possible method, from our online booking portal to over-the-counter transactions and even cheques sent by post. The impact on revenue has been significant, but the cooperation and patience shown by our anglers during this process has been truly appreciated. On behalf of everyone at Bristol Water, we extend our sincere thanks for your understanding and continued support during what has been an exceptionally challenging time for both our fisheries and our team.

Stocking

The final stockings of the 2025 season took place in September, following the large introduction of 6,700 fish into Chew Valley Lake in late August. Chew received a further 5,600 fish, while Blagdon was stocked with an additional 1,000 fish across September and October. The Barrow Tanks also saw 800 fish added, bringing the season's stocking programme to a close and ensuring excellent angling opportunities heading into the autumn until the end of the season.

Blagdon Lake

Blagdon Lake remains closed for boat fishing; however, it continues to be open for bank angling for both season ticket holders and day-ticket visitors. While access is still available, we wish to manage expectations by reminding anglers that the water levels remain exceptionally low, and that reaching productive fishing spots can involve crossing areas of exposed sand, gravel, and mud, as well as wading in shallow margins. We strongly encourage everyone to exercise caution and good judgement when planning their sessions, allowing additional time for access and ensuring that safety always comes first. The use of a wading staff is highly recommended, and we advise anglers, wherever possible, to fish with a partner and waders.

Despite these ongoing challenges with access, the fishing itself has remained consistently productive, with plenty of fish reported from key areas including in front of the Lodge, Green Lawn, and Cheddar Water. When a Northerly wind has made these exposed spots difficult to fish, anglers have still found good success in more sheltered locations.



In terms of methods, anglers have found flies presented high in the water to be most effective during settled conditions, with foam daddies and hoppers proving especially reliable choices. During windier or more unsettled spells, switching to small lures or nymphs retrieved just below the surface has brought consistent results. Overall, while access requires extra care and preparation, those who have persevered have been rewarded with some truly enjoyable and productive sport on Blagdon.

Chew Valley



The final weeks of boat fishing at Chew Valley Lake brought a real mix of conditions, with water clarity fluctuating dramatically, from 3–4ft visibility on the better days to as little as 18 inches during periods of heavy colouration. Despite these challenges, anglers who adapted their approach continued to enjoy productive sport. Success often came to those presenting flies high in the water, with washing line setups proving particularly effective. A combination of Boobies on the point and top dropper helped keep flies near the surface, while Cormorants, Hoppers, and small lures fished on the droppers created just enough disturbance to draw aggressive takes from cruising trout.

September and October also hosted several key competitions, including the Airflo Shield Final, the BRFFA Hidden Pairs and Hidden Teams, and the Fluff Chuckers Multi-Species Event, all of which delivered excellent fishing despite challenging conditions.

Alongside these events, the return of the Pike Trials saw high participation and some exceptional captures. Bank anglers also enjoyed success on trout, particularly from Woodford Bank, Nunnery, and Walley Bank, using fry patterns, lures, and washing line setups. The trout season continued robustly through this period, with anglers still reporting good sport right through to November.

Barrow tanks

Throughout September, the Barrow Tanks saw a vast improvement in catches following a challenging start to the month. Early September proved tricky, with anglers reporting plenty of fish activity but finding them hard to tempt. However, by mid-September, the fishing switched on in spectacular fashion. One angler even recorded a catch-and-release session of 17 fish on Tank 3 using dark fly patterns. Since then, all three tanks have been productive, with many anglers reaching their catch limits.

On Tank 3, the inflow area has continued to fish particularly well, while White Wall has also produced some excellent results. Fry patterns have been especially effective, often tempting the better-quality fish. Tanks 1 and 2 have both performed consistently along the natural banks, with lures and fry imitations proving to be the flies of choice. Tank 1 has produced some impressive specimens in recent weeks.

With water levels fluctuating frequently, our team has been closely monitoring the safety of the banks. As a result, on 9th November, we made the decision to close Tank 3 due to low water levels exposing slippery and unstable margins. This measure ensures both angler safety and the protection of the fishery while levels remain reduced. We ask all anglers to adhere to this until the levels at tank 3 increase and we lift the closure.

Pike Trails

October also saw the return of the pike angling at Chew Lake. The return of pike angling this autumn brought an incredible buzz of excitement back to Chew Valley Lake, with anglers from across the country eager to wet a line once again. Despite the challenging conditions and falling water levels, the start of the trials saw some truly exceptional catches and memorable days on the water. Among the standout fish were several 30lb+specimens, including David Rossiter's stunning 37lb 7oz pike caught in early October, Andy Carpenter's 35lb 4oz giant from the bank, Gavin Fudge's 31lb 11oz lure-caught personal best, and Carl Garratt's 31lb 14oz pike taken on a dead bait off Nunnery. The quality of the fishing reminded everyone why Chew remains one of the UK's most celebrated predator venues. Both bank and boat anglers made the most of the available opportunities, with a real sense of camaraderie and excitement across the fishery. Even with the boating season cut short due to low water levels, it was a memorable autumn for many who managed to connect with one of Chew's legendary predators.

This season's Pike Trials saw an impressive turnout of angler's keen to make the most of the limited bank availability; however, the start of the pike fishing period was unfortunately marked by a number of rule breaches. Several anglers were found using banned baits and accessing the banks prior to their allocated fishing times. As outlined in our regulations, these actions compromise both fairness and safety, and as such, the individuals involved were excluded from the fishery under our zero-tolerance policy. While these situations are always disappointing to address, maintaining high standards of conduct is essential to protect the welfare of our fish and ensure an enjoyable and fair experience for all. We would like to remind all future pike anglers to carefully read and adhere to the rules and regulations before fishing, which are available on the Bristol Water website.

Conditions started favourably, with a gentle southerly breeze, comfortable temperatures around 18°C, and fish rising in front of the jetties and along Woodford Bank. As the boats set off just before 10am, most anglers headed towards the cages and sailing club area, while a few explored Moreton and Nunnery. Garafit Cup 18/10/2025

The Garafit Cup 2025, held on Saturday 18th October, brought Chew Valley's boat fishing season to a spectacular close, with 80 anglers taking to the water for what proved to be a hugely successful and enjoyable day. Despite the falling water levels marking the end of the boating season, the competition went out with a bang. The lake fished superbly, producing an impressive 291 trout and a rod average of 3.63.

Top honours went to Matthew Griffiths, whose 13 fish for 26lb 12oz earned him the Top Rod title. In second place was Paul Roach with 10 fish for 22lb 14oz, followed closely by Mark Miles in third with 11 fish for 22lb 11oz. It was also fantastic to see four junior anglers taking part, all of whom went home with prizes, a promising sign for the future of the sport.

Cancelled competitions and events

With the cancellation of all the boats on Chew, competitions planned for the latter half of October and November were cancelled. The Champion of Champions competition faced an unfortunate series of cancellations during the 2025 season, ultimately being called off for a third time following the closure of boat angling on Chew Valley Lake due to low water levels. Originally scheduled to take place on 20th July, the event was first postponed because of the extreme heat experienced during mid-summer. A rescheduled date of 31st August was then also cancelled, this time due to high winds, making conditions unsafe for anglers. The final planned date of 1st November was sadly abandoned following the rapid drop in water levels at Chew, which made boat launching and recovery impossible. We would like to thank all the anglers who showed great patience and understanding through these repeated postponements. We are now looking ahead to bringing the Champion of Champions back for the 2026 season. As always, this prestigious, invitation-only event will welcome those who have achieved top placings in previous competitions.

For the same reasons as the Champion of Champions, other boating competitions had to be cancelled on Chew including the Bristol Water end of season competition and the Bristo Water Pike Competition. This year was to be the return of the Bristol water pike competition which was last held in 2019. Despite this competition being cancelled, we will be looking to keep the draw for the pairs entered to compete the same for the 2026 pike competition with the continued sponsor from Fox Rage!

Looking forward

As we approach the final few weeks of the 2025 season, the lakes continue to face the challenges of low water levels, the lowest we've seen in decades. Despite these conditions, it's been another fantastic period across our fisheries, with memorable events such as the Garafit Cup, Airflo Shield Final, and Fluff Chuckers Multi-Species day showcasing the passion and resilience of our angling community. The pike trials have also returned with some impressive early catches, while Blagdon and the Barrow Tanks have continued to produce excellent sport for those fishing from the banks.

Barrow Tank 3 will remain closed to all users until levels are deemed safe by Bristol Water, but Chew, Blagdon, and Tanks 1 and 2 remain open for bank fishing, with additional Pike Bank Days scheduled through November.

We'd like to extend our sincere thanks to all of our Bristol Water Fisheries staff for their continued hard work and dedication, and to our loyal anglers and visitors for their support and understanding throughout what has been a challenging but rewarding season.
